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## 1 Introduction

#### Introduction

- 1.1 Section 18 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 (as amended) requires local planning authorities to prepare a Statement of Community Involvement (SCI). The purpose of this document is to provide details about the consultation which has taken place during the production of the Statement of Community Involvement (SCI).
- **1.2** Full details as to how the consultation was undertaken are included in the statement as well as the results of the consultation and how these results have been addressed in the SCI itself.
- **1.3** The SCI sets standards and methods that will be followed for engaging residents, local groups, stakeholders and statutory consultees in:
- The preparation of planning policy documents
- Determining planning applications.
- 1.4 It covers High Peak Borough (excluding the part within the Peak District National Park).
- 1.5 The Council's most recent Statement of Community Involvement was adopted in February 2019. As the High Peak Local Plan is being reviewed, it has been considered appropriate to review the SCI, bringing it in line with current legislation and public engagement methods.

## 2 Consultation



- **2.1** The draft Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) was considered by the Economy and Growth Select committee on 24<sup>th</sup> November 2022 and by the Executive on 8<sup>th</sup> December 2022, where it was approved for a six week period of public consultation which took place between 19<sup>th</sup> January and 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2023.
- 2.2 Notifications of the consultation were sent by email or letter to relevant contacts on the Council's planning policy consultee database.
- 2.3 The consultation was publicised in a number of ways: Letters and emails with details of the consultation were sent to individuals and organisations who had previously expressed an interest in being involved with the preparation of planning policy documents and those organisations the Council has a duty to consult. The SCI was available to view and download from the Council's website. Hard copies were placed in Borough libraries and Council offices. The consultation was promoted via the Council's website, Facebook page and Twitter account. There was also a press release issued with details of the consultation.
- **2.4** Consultees were able to view the document and make comments online and/or via email. There is free internet access at Council offices and local libraries to assist with this.
- 2.5 Where consultees did not wish to respond to the consultation online a paper response form was available which could be completed and returned by email or post. The response form did not ask specific questions but asked for comments on the document.
- 2.6 Details of the organisations consulted are in appendix 1 and details of consultation responses are in appendix 2. Details of consultation methods are in appendix 3.



# 3 Summary of Representations and Modifications

- **3.1** Eight responses to the public consultation on the updated SCI were received. Details of these responses, Council comment and any resultant modifications are detailed in appendix 2.
- 3.2 The statutory bodies, Environment Agency, Coal Authority and Natural England supported engagement and confirmed contact details.
- 3.3 No Objections were received.
- **3.4** No late representations were received.
- 3.5 Three responses to the consultation were supportive of the principle of meaningful and early engagement of the general community, community organisations and statutory bodies in local planning matters, both in terms of shaping policy and participating in the process of determining planning applications.



The Borough Council is asking for views on three documents:


- Local Plan Review- the Council is starting the review of the Local Plan. This early engagement document will highlight some
  of the key issues that need to be considered as part of the drafting of a new Local Plan to cover the period to 2041 to help the
  Council understand the key issues to be tackled and any suggestions for future sites to develop or protect.
- Developer Contributions guidance for affordable housing, open spaces, education, health and other infrastructure required to address the impact of development and how contributions will be calculated.
- Statement of Community Involvement this document sets out how the Council will engage with residents, businesses
  and other organisations in decision making on policy documents and planning applications.

Leader of the Council, Councillor Anthony Mckeown, said: "Our Local Plan was adopted in 2016 and is now due for review. This initial round of consultation will help to shape and focus our planning policy and decision making on planning in the coming years.

"Our Local Plan sets out the blueprint for how the High Peak will develop in the future, including where housing, employment sites and retail should be, and this is chance for everyone that lives and works in High Peak to tell us their thoughts so it's really important that we hear from our residents and businesses.




